When longtime Oak Grove attendee Bill Cianelli officially joined the congregation on March 8, by transfer of letter, it was more than just a formality.

"It felt very comforting and I could feel the presence of the congregation and see how welcoming, kind and loving they were to me," he says. "It seemed like the entire congregation came up afterwards to wish me well, and that really meant a great deal to me."

Bill and his family members have been contributors in many ways at Oak Grove for decades, and several years ago Bill took the Exploration Classes for membership while Ed Woodard was still pastor.

"Both Ed and J.D. speak the truth and speak from the heart, and that has always impressed me about both of them," he says.

Speaking of making an impression, Bill's wife Laurie did just that back in the 1980s. Bill had spent his first three years of college at Shepherd College in West Virginia before transferring to Bridgewater for his senior year. I just started talking to her from my heart, and she was just someone I was able to relate to and get along with from the start," he says.

Bill grew up in Hagerstown, Maryland, but his grandparents had a farm in Wythe County, Virginia and he spent a lot of time there as a youngster. He did a lot of farm work, hunting and fishing and loved riding his grandfather's horses.

"My least favorite part was bailing hay because I had really bad allergies, and that used to tear me up," he says.

He also learned a great deal about cooking around the farm from his mother's side of the family. His mom, grandmother, and great-grandmother all inspired him, taught him, and gave him the confidence to cook anything from a recipe and to branch out and make his own creations.

"Madison is just amazing, and I love her to death," he says. "She is so special and very wise and mature for her age."

He also helped found a school at the Virginia Baptist Children's Home and taught at Minnick Education Center. "I loved teaching while I was doing it, but you would have to nail me to a chair and chain me to the floor to get me back into a classroom today," he says.

Marlene Morgenstern and Bernard have been married for 36 years. Marlene is a psychiatric nurse at the VA Hospital in Salem. Bernard says he is convinced she is not a very good nurse, because she has been married to him so long and has not helped him at all. He says the hardest thing he had to learn in marriage is to say "yes, dear" with a poker face. Bernard and Marlene have two sons, Joshua and David. Josh is an aero-space engineer, and David is head of security at GE in Salem.

"I became a Christian when I was 14 years old on a church retreat. I was full of zeal for a while but, as happens to many people, I became a part-time Christian

most of the time and an in-name-only Christian the rest of the time. Five years ago I had a come-to-Jesus moment and have been steadfast since then. I will be glad to teach you and let you practice as many times as you need until you feel comfortable serving. You may continue to be an acolyte through your high school years.

Please let me know if you are interested. Remember, at Oak Grove an acolyte ministers by lighting candles during worship and bringing the light of Jesus into the sanctuary and back out into the world.

I feel the transition from your long-time pastor to this time of interim has gone smoothly, and I am committed to doing what I can to make the transition from my time with you to your new pastor go smoothly as well. Thank you for the ways you have welcomed me into your lives. I have been blessed by my time with you.
