Lenten Discipline

During Lent, we consider the cost of following Jesus. Jesus came into the world to bring hope and light. Angels pronounced "peace on earth" when he was born. Magi came and brought gifts when Jesus "moved into the neighborhood" (John 1:14, *The Message*). The Apostle John says that "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it."

But the darkness surely tried. Grace and truth are appreciated until they cost us something.

Take a look at the picture on the bulletin cover. It's not the type of picture we normally place there. I wonder how the argument this couple was having got to the point of utter frustration. I wonder if they will reconcile and return to happier times.

As we continue thinking about the Parable of the Prodigal Son, consider these words, told from the perspective of the older brother:

Why do I feel so bad, heavy hearted, sad inside? Why at a time of celebration am I bitter—unable to join in? Why do I feel neglected, unwanted, unloved, uncelebrated?

I'm supposed to open my arms too, without judging.
I'm supposed to forgive, without entertaining thoughts of punishment or justice.
I'm not sure I'm ready for this—it will take time.
I'm not sure I'm big enough for this—it will take more love than I feel.

"He was lost and has been found," I'm told.

"Come celebrate and rejoice," I'm invited.

"All that I have is yours," I'm promised.

"He's your brother," I'm reminded.

Who do you have trouble forgiving?

There is a cost to following Jesus, a cost that led Jesus to the cross. This costliness is represented in our extinguishing one candle each Sunday of Lent, until the last candle is extinguished on Good Friday, the day of darkness on which Jesus died.
